Alaska Judicial Council Recommendation

Justice Alexander O. Bryner, Supreme Court

- *I. Judicial Council Evaluation.* The Alaska Judicial Council, a non-partisan citizens commission established by the Alaska Constitution, finds Justice Bryner to be *Qualified* and recommends unanimously (6-0) that the public vote "YES" to retain him as a supreme court justice.
- II. Summary of Evaluation Information. In a survey sent to all 2,644 attorneys in Alaska, Justice Bryner was rated in the excellent range on overall judicial performance (4.3, see graph). He scored highest (4.5) in the category of "conduct free from impropriety," and "preparation for appeals." He scored 4.0 or better in all ten categories.



A survey of all court employees rated Justice Bryner in the excellent range (4.3) on overall performance.

The Council also completed a background investigation including a court records check, a disciplinary records check, a review of conflict of interest statements submitted to the court system, a review of any withheld salary warrants and a review of financial disclosure statements submitted to the Alaska Public Offices Commission. Attorneys and court employees were asked to submit written comments about the judge. The Council actively encouraged the public to comment, both in writing and in a statewide public hearing teleconference.



Recommendation: Vote "YES" to retain Justice Bryner

Response to No. 3:

The Alaska Supreme Court has seen the appointment of four new justices during the past five years. For me, joining the court during this period of transition has been an exciting, rewarding, and intensely challenging experience. My greatest challenges have been in acquainting myself with the court's diverse and complex civil caseload, assimilating the myriad administrative issues that the court regularly considers, and adjusting to the court's internal procedures and five-judge voting dynamic, which tend to be far more intricate, formalized, and rigorous than the relatively straightforward three-judge process that I had grown so accustomed to in the court of appeals.

I would say that I have made satisfactory progress toward meeting these challenges. Though I have sometimes found it frustratingly difficult to keep pace with the daily flow of paperwork and with the demands of my caseload, the experience of serving on the court is deeply rewarding. Our cases expose me to fascinating issues, involve me in a constant process of learning and growth, and enable me to participate in resolving difficult legal problems. I have always believed that the best way for me to contribute to our system of justice is to decide cases fairly and justly, case by case. I have tried very hard to contribute to the court in this way, and hope that I have succeeded in making a contribution. I look forward enthusiastically to continued service on the court. My impression is that the court has passed through a period of transition and is developing a renewed sense of itself as an institution. In my view, the future holds promise for progress in reducing appellate delay, in increasing the court's efficiency and responsiveness, and in broadening public access to justice.

RE: Comparison of Previous Survey Results - Alexander O. Bryner

Alexander O. Bryner is standing for retention in 2000. The tables on the following pages compare retention and selection survey scores for Justice Bryner. Changes in the form and content of the various surveys should be noted carefully in making any comparisons.

Justice Bryner previously stood for retention in 1976 as a district court judge (survey scores attached), and in 1984 and 1992 as a Court of Appeals Judge. He was evaluated with other non-retention judges in 1990 and 1998.

Justice Bryner applied for the Anchorage District Court in 1975, the Sitka Superior Court in 1976, the Anchorage Superior Court in 1977, the Court of Appeals in 1980, and the Supreme Court in 1983 and 1996 (twice). He was appointed to the Anchorage District Court in 1975, the Court of Appeals in 1980 and the Supreme Court in 1996.

Department of Administration Paycheck Holds


The Council requested information from the Department of Administration about how many times the retention justices' and judges' paychecks were withheld in 1998 and 1999 for failure to issue decisions within six months. See AS 22.05.140(b), 22.07.090(b), 22.10.190(b), and 22.15.220(c). Justice Bryner's paycheck was withheld for one or two pay periods six times in 1998 and once in 1999, and it was withheld for less than a full pay period six times in 1999. Justice Bryner explained this tardiness by stating that his abrupt transfer from the Court of Appeals to the Supreme Court in 1997 left him responsible for cases in both of the appellate courts for a period of time. This responsibility, combined with staffing disruptions caused by his transfer and his desire to be cautious and thorough in his supreme court responsibilities, caused him to exceed the statutory period for issuing decisions on several occasions. Justice Bryner's DOA paycheck record sheet and his letter responding to our query are attached to this memorandum.



Dear Mr. Cotton:

Thank you for your letter offering me an opportunity to explain the periods in 1998 and 1999 when the Department of Administration delayed issuance of my paycheck.

The situation grew out of my transition from the court of appeals to the supreme court. I began hearing supreme court cases almost immediately upon appointment to the court in 1997. At the same time, I had to remain active on a significant number of court of appeals cases that had already been submitted and could not be reassigned without serious inconvenience and delay. My desire to be cautious and thorough in addressing my new case assignments, the demands of winding down my court of appeals cases, and some unavoidable staffing disruptions caused by my abrupt move left me with a build-up of cases that eventually required me to delay claiming my paycheck for several brief periods during 1998-99.

I appreciate the Council's concern with this matter and would of course be happy to discuss it more fully upon request by the Council.
