 Please describe your participation on court/bar committees or other administrative activities during your current term of office.

I have been on the Judicial Conference committee and am currently on the Family Court committee. I formed the Trauma Committee and worked with the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges (NCJFCJ) to obtain a trauma assessment of the Anchorage and Fairbanks courts. The assessment involved all the stakeholders in CINA and juvenile cases. This assessment consisted of focus groups of our staff, PDs, AG and private stakeholders, a survey from judges and other staff members. The assessment is available for review. A result of our relationship with NCJFCJ is that Fairbanks is an inplementaiton site and continues to work with NCJFCJ to become a fully trauma informed court. The Anchorage court is also moving towards becoming a trauma informed court.

3. Please describe any judicial or legal education you have undertaken or provided during your current term in office.

I have been invited to teach at several conferences around the nation. I have taught culture and family law; implicit bias and family law; resist/refuse dynamics in parental custody; evidence in family law; how to use an expert at trial; the application of social science in family courts. I am presenting at the AFCC Annual meeting. I cannot remember all of them.

I have taken classes in resist/refust dynamics in custody cases; implicit bias, the application of culture in family law cases. I represented our courts at the Justice Involved Individuals with Substance Use Disorders: Cultivating Law and Medicine Partnership. I am teaching the judicial track at the national AFCC seminar in Boston next year. I am the Chair of the DE&I committee of the AFCC board and have presented at several of their webinars. I have been published in the Family Court Review, an interdisciplinary Journal.

4. Please describe any public outreach activities during your current term in office.

I have spoken at Shilo community development events. I am on the national board of American Family and Facilitation Courts (AFCC). I am a Judicial Fellow on the International Association of Family Law Attorneys. Each year I mentor students from the Anchorage School District and attend their end of the year event. I currently am mentoring a student from Polaris, who is interested in the law. I participate in the Color of Justice program every year. I am Speaking for ADVSA at their legal advocacy and wellness training program on December 7, 2023. I am a member of the DE&I collaberative. This is a national organization, consisting of judges and other organizations around the country. The purpose of the group is to address diversity, equality and inclusion in courts around the country. This work is important because Alaska is one of the most diversive communities in the country. It's important that Alaskans have a diverse legal and judicial community. It's important that I bring information back to my community to address DE&I in our legal system. I am also on the board of the Performing Arts Center (PAC).

I have only done Rule 11 agreements. However, I have discretion to accept the agreement or not. Under these circumstances the victim's statement is very important to me. I want to hear what the impact had on their lives. That information helps me determine if the sentence meets the Chaney criteria and more importantly, does the agreement provide justice to the victim, as allowed by law.

6. Please assess, in one or two paragraphs, your judicial performance during your present term. Appropriate areas of comment could include: satisfaction with your judicial role, specific contributions to the judiciary or the field of law, increases in legal knowledge and judicial skills, or other measures of judicial abilities that you believe to be important.

I consider my judicial performance as good. I recognize that there is always something to learn. That no case is the same because the parties are different. That is why I spend my own money to attend seminars on issues that I can use in this job. I am active in National organizations that focus on issues that we address daily. I am a national board member of AFCC, This is a multi-disciplinary organization that focuses on issues that impact families. This organization provides the best practices on such things as custody evaluations, GAL, parenting coodinators, trauma, substance abuse disorders, refuse/resist dynamics in families. Because of my association with this organization I have been able to bring national experts to attend our judicial conference and educate our judges.

Because of my outside activities I learned what is a trauma informed court. I recognize that our community members suffer from trauma before they come into court. There are best practices that can alleviate the traumatic experience of appearing in court. I have been able to bring this information to our court administration and move us in that direction.

On the daily side, I recognize that we have a number of new lawyers who have not properly been mentored. They are hanging up their shingles and coming into court with no experience. I hold my court to a standard and attempt to convey to the young attorneys the importance of finding a mentor to help them. Or guide them in proper court practices. I also hold the older attorneys to a standard of advocacy that respects the importance of this institution. Co-vid changed the practice of law; some for the better and some for the worse. I see our role as judges to keep the best that came out of co-vid, i.e. zoom hearings, and to bring back a level of advocacy that promotes justice for clients and to respect the process and the institution.

Everyone receives respect and is heard in my court room. It is important that I apply the same courtesies to lawyers and self-represented litigants. Judicial temperament is important. It has been my experience that most people are okay with my decisions if they feel that I listened to them and they had their day in court. I believe I achieve that goal.

To do this I have educated myself by attending seminars, and belonging to organizations that educate and inform on best practices. Alaska is an isolated community, so we cannot know it all. I recognize how traumatic courts can be to participants. We have more self-represented litigants than ever before. It is our job to make their experience less traumatic and make sure they feel heard. It is also our job to hold attorneys to a level of advocacy that moves cases and respects this institution. I feel I am achieving these goals. I am learning every day how to become a better judge for my community. When I got this job, I told the governor this is my way of giving back what Alaska has provided me and my family. I still feel that way.
